# CELEBRATING O YEARS IN Planned Parenthood

# Reno's health center turns 50

Thanks to you, the Biggest Little City is getting a new Planned Parenthood health center

In a poignant moment of irony, our Reno health center reached its fiftieth birthday this year – just as the Supreme Court rejected a half-century precedent and overturned *Roe v. Wade*.

The devastating decision is expected to rob millions of people in 26 states of autonomy over their own bodies, but abortion is still legal in Nevada. And PPMM is proud to be breaking ground on a large new health center that will open in Reno next year, providing a full range of preventive and reproductive health care — including medication and in-center abortion care.

"I think of our (current) health center as the 'Biggest Little Health Center,' in the Biggest Little City," PPMM Reno Clinician Kate Schopp said. "Being able to expand will allow us to see more patients."

Serving increasing numbers of people in places and at times that are most convenient for them is part of our long-term strategy, which you're helping to make happen. It is especially important as we expect to see more patients come to us from states where abortion is now illegal.

"We're not accepting the status quo," said PPMM Chief Medical Operating Officer Dr. Laura Dalton. "I came here to reduce stigma and improve the patient experience. In the face of adversity we're going to thrive."

Associate Medical Director Dr. Jessica Hamilton said the "heartbreaking" post-Roe landscape may still open new possibilities for providing essential care to patients in California and Nevada, where abortion remains safe and legal.

"These times of crisis are a wonderful opportunity for creativity," she said. "We've already been preparing. I'm hopeful that now we will further streamline care for greater access."

Dr. Hamilton recently hired another provider in Reno and plans to bring on another in the next year.

"Patients in Northern Nevada and the Tahoe basin - there's a desert of health care in this area," she said. "I try to get care for myself and my family, and it's challenging. So to start having these services, I'm thrilled! It could not happen soon enough."


Once the doors are open at the new Reno site, Kate Schopp knows it will also become a trusted community health center for people who need it most.

"Young, uninsured patients often decline contraception and screening for STIs because of financial constraints," Kate said. "They are extremely grateful when PPMM can help cover the cost of STI screening, Pap smears, and contraception with the donations we receive."

She recalled one patient who came to the 50-year-old Reno health center last month but didn't have the money or insurance to cover their visit.

"We were able to use donated funds to cover the cost of their appointment," Kate said. "They were so grateful that they came back and paid it forward for the next patient. The clinicians and the patients are always thankful for the generosity of the donors in our community."

## Patsy Montgomery retired last month after more than 30 years with Planned Parenthood Mar Monte.

She began her career as a health educator in Fresno and was most recently director of Public Affairs operations. From marching in Fresno Pride to rallying with her mentor, legendary UFW co-founder Dolores Huerta, Patsy was and always will be committed to the mission of PPMM. Like you, she ensures that people can get health care they need, no matter what.

Here are some of Patsy's favorite memories about the work you helped her to accomplish.

### What is your favorite PPMM memory?

Being the director of Education in the late 1990's and having a LGBTQ+ and homeless youth drop-in center led by amazing, talented people. They created a safe space for people ages 12-24 who needed a place where they could be feel valued and "seen." I remain in touch with those staff members and the LGBTQ+ youth whose lives it affirmed.

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### What career success are you most proud of?

Gaining the endorsement of the Bakersfield Californian to oppose three parental notification initiatives, which used the (PP) campaign's messaging to oppose the dangerous initiative. When the first editorial was published, it gave hope to the statewide campaign since the paper had never before supported any initiative that was "left-of-center."

### What was the biggest hurdle PPMM faced in your career?

We are facing the biggest ever challenge with the Supreme Court's decision to decimate *Roe v. Wade*. It will negatively impact everything from abortion to hormonal birth control, gay marriage to interracial marriage and the lives of transgender children and their parents.

### How will PPMM expansion help the patients we serve?

Many of our patients travel long distances to access full reproductive health care, including gender affirming care. At a public hearing in Visalia, a young queer person, speaking before policy makers for the first time said, "No doctor in this town wants to see me because of the pronouns I use or the way I look... PP is the only place I feel safe. Please let them build and expand their services."



I recently learned of another patient in a rural community who needed an abortion which wasn't available at the PPMM health center in her town. Her car broke down on the way to her out-of-county

PPMM health center. She could barely afford the gas, and now she had a car to repair in addition to taking another day off work - just to get what should be basic health care. Expansion of services to meet the current and anticipated needs of people from within our territory and other states is more important now than ever before in my 31 year tenure.

#### What do you think most people get wrong about PPMM?

We often forget that the vast majority of people support our work. The anti-PP people are often louder, and the media often gives life to narratives that somehow all we care about is abortion. All of us need to make certain we don't miss the opportunities to speak-up when we hear misinformation about our work and our impact.

### What would you like to tell donors?

I recently came across an old document from our Fresno region. It was quoting the iconic American news anchor Walter Cronkite who reported in August of 1971, "Today in the Central Valley of California, a small group of visionary leaders opened the first Planned Parenting clinic in Fresno. It remains to be seen who will follow in their footsteps."

YOU are the visionary leaders Walter Cronkite spoke about.

From that small clinic in the basement of Fresno's First Christian Church emerged two health centers now serving more than 22,000 unique patients annually. Through your financial support and engagement in public policy advocacy, PPMM can continue to grow and live up to the prophetic words spoken on the evening news in 1971.
