THE PLANNED PARENTHOOD SAFETY NET

The woman who called the UHPP Albany health center was in her early 30's. "She asked if she could schedule an appointment for birth control," related Center Director Julie Pierino, "and was very concerned about how much it would cost. When I told her if she was income qualified, her appointment and birth control could be free for an entire year, she became very emotional." The young woman explained to Julie that she had been recently laid off and that she had never been in a position before where she didn't have health insur-

ance. She called hoping she could pay a small amount out of pocket, but said it would have been very hard. "She was so relieved to know that she could continue her birth control," explained Julie, "and could take care of her health care needs during this difficult time in her life."

According to the New York State
Department of Health, an estimated 2.5 million New Yorkers currently lack health insurance. While
state and federal government leaders
work at addressing both the economic and

health care crises, Upper Hudson Planned Parenthood is part

of a national network of Planned Parenthood health centers that are providing a critical safety net, ensuring that both women and men can obtain the reproductive health care services they need to prevent unintended pregnancy, plan wanted pregnancies and safeguard against sexually transmitted infections and related cancers.

Sara Grondahl, Senior Client Services Representative, described her recent appointment with a young married

couple. "They were looking forward to becoming parents when the husband lost his job. Now, after two months of unemployment and no job prospects, they felt like they had no option but to terminate the pregnancy. They were really surprised and happy to hear that we could help them enroll in Prenatal Medicaid, and that they would qualify for full health care coverage for the mother throughout her pregnancy and for the baby for up to a year after delivery. While the husband continued to look for work, the coverage

granted them the ability to continue their wanted pregnancy, knowing that both mother and child would have the health care they needed."

As the numbers of unemployed and uninsured has risen, so has the demand for both family planning and abortion services at UHPP. According to UHPP President/CEO Patricia McGeown, "while the ability to plan the timing and size of one's family is always important, and a key factor in positive health care outcomes for mothers and children, its importance is magnified during times of economic upheaval. Families are coping with new and difficult challenges, and everyone is trying to get by with less. An unintended pregnancy can become a tipping point in an individual or family's ability to cope with such stress. Women fear they must choose between groceries or birth control; between a child's vaccination and their own Pap test. Because of Planned Parenthood, women can take care of their health, plan their pregnancies, and also take care of other priorities."

From Patricia A. McGeown, President/CEO

This year Upper Hudson Planned Parenthood is celebrating our Diamond Anniversary! We have been serving the community for 75 years! In 1934, in the middle of the Great Depression, the women of Albany desperately needed information about preventing pregnancy, planning families and spacing children. Then, as now, an unintended pregnancy in the midst of economic hardship could mean disaster for a woman and her family. So Dr. Frances Vosburgh began providing birth control information to married women in her office on State Street in Albany. That was the beginning of the Mothers' Health Center and, ultimately, Upper Hudson Planned Parenthood.

A lot has transpired in the ensuing 75 years. As reported in Dr. Mary Kahl's wonderful history *Controversy and Courage*, UHPP has been evicted, harassed, vilified, threatened and sued. But we have never been ignored and we have never been stopped.

Back Up Your Birth Control UHPP OFFERS FREE EC

In March, UHPP launched a new media campaign to promote FREE Emergency Contraception(EC) now available at all three UHPP health centers, while supplies last. The program promotes the concept that women should "Back Up Your Birth Control," by keeping a supply of EC in their medicine cabinets. EC, a \$25 value, is now available to all patients and nonpatients over the counter. According to federal law, those under age 18 require a quick nurse visit.

EC can help prevent pregnancy even if taken up to five days after unprotected sex. However, it is most



effective if taken within 72 hours. With funding provided by a grant from the NYS Department of Health, UHPP is able to provide women with a second chance to prevent possible pregnancy.

Each year in the United States, 300,000 teens become pregnant. All medical evidence supports that EC is safe and effective for women of all ages.


GYT 09! – A PARTNERSHIP WITH MTV

Americans across the country were surprised and alarmed when the Centers for Disease Control released a study in 2008 that reported 26% of young American women, aged 14-19, are infected with at least one of the four most common sexually transmitted infections. This amounts to around 3.2 million, or one in four female teenagers.

On April 1, in response to this problem, a national month-long multi-media public awareness campaign called Get Yourself Tested 2009, or "GYT09" was launched by MTV and the Kaiser Family Foundation, in cooperation with Planned Parenthood Federation of America.

MTV launched the campaign with the airing of the documentary "*Pedro*," based on the life of the real Pedro Zamora, an HIV-positive actor who gained national attention on the reality television series, *Real World*. Pedro dedicated his life to HIV/AIDS education until his death from AIDS related complications. MTV developed a series of humorous and provocative PSAs and contributed \$2.6 million dollars of free air time on multiple stations or an average of 200 spots every week for four weeks!

The Kaiser Foundation developed and launched a website (www.GYT09.org) for the campaign to help people find the nearest Planned Parenthood or local health center to get tested. They also produced campaign posters, flyers, buttons and stickers for the health centers.



UHPP helped organize "watch parties" to view and discuss the movie, aired videos and PSAs about testing in our health centers and put a special emphasis on the promotion of testing services during the campaign.

FUNDING FOR REPRODUCTIVE **HEALTH CARE**

In times of economic hardship and unprecedented budget deficits, an investment in family planning provides vital health care services to New York families and cost savings to the State.

Progress: The Governor's proposed budget includes flat funding for family planning services. In early March, Assembly member Amy Paulin circulated a letter addressed to Speaker Sheldon Silver urging him to support a legislative add-on of \$675,000 for family planning funding. While we made phone calls to local legislators, none of them were among the 59 Democratic and Independent members who co-signed the letter. Please call to express your disappointment and urge them to vote in favor of this add-on as part of the final budget.

TWO IMPORTANT WINS:

Obama Administration Moves To Rescind HHS Midnight Rule

The Obama administration has proposed a new rule that rescinds the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) midnight regulation rule issued in the last days of the Bush administration. Under the original rule, all health care workers from physicians to interns obtained the right to deny vital health care information and services to patients, potentially without the patient's knowledge, based on moral or religious beliefs. Over 200,000 comments in opposition to the rule were submitted and ignored.

Success in the Fight for Affordable Birth Control

Following the omission by Congress of a few key sentences in the 2008 Omnibus Budget Bill, the price of birth control sky-rocketed by 900 percent on many college campuses and some family planning centers. The omitted section had enabled pharmacies to provide women's health centers and college campuses with low cost birth control. Locally, students at Sage Colleges and RPI launched petition and post card drives as they saw their birth control options shrink and prices rise. In March, after a year of aggressive advocacy by Planned Parenthood, Congress restored this language. We will be following up with local campuses to ensure they are informed and working to restore affordable birth control to students.

PROTECT WOMEN'S HEALTH



Our goal is to pass the Reproductive Health
Act and protect the fundamental right of
women to control their own personal and

private reproductive health decisions including the right to choose or refuse contraception and abortion care.

Progress: The Governor and leaders from both the Senate and the Assembly have voiced their support for passage of the bill during this legislative session. UHPP staff and local activists met with targeted legislators during March and April to discuss any concerns or questions they may have about supporting this legislation.

SEX EDUCATION

We will continue to push for passage of the Healthy Teens Act which would establish a grant program to help schools and communities provide teens with real sex education and strengthen parent-teen communication. On the federal level, we will oppose continued funding of abstinence-only sex education and support Prevention First legislation which will allow youth across the country to have access to comprehensive sex education.

Progress: Budget constraints may prevent passage of the Healthy Teens Act this session, unless new federal funds become available. In early March, Sen. Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ) and Rep. Barbara Lee (D-CA) introduced the Responsible Education About Life (REAL) Act in Congress. The REAL Act would authorize federal funding for comprehensive, medically accurate, age-appropriate sex education. Currently, no federal program is dedicated to supporting comprehensive sex education, while failed abstinence-only programs under the Bush administration received \$1.5 billion in federal funding.

Immigrant Women's Health

Immigrants constitute a significant portion of un-served and underserved women, making it less likely for them to receive preventive family planning care. We will work to ensure Medicaid reimbursement for interpreter and/or language line services in hospitals and clinic settings.

UHPP Activism in Action



On January 12, 2009, 33 UHPP staff and volunteers joined hundreds of pro-choice New York activists at the Women's Health Matters Day of Advocacy. Lobby visits to our local Senators and Assembly members revealed a new and generally positive attitude toward family planning and the Healthy Teens Act.



On March 16, 2009, 36 young high school and college students from Albany and Columbia Counties participated in a statewide Youth Leadership Conference at the Empire Plaza. Assemlyman Marcus Molinaro (R-103) stopped by the conference to talk with our S.T.A.R.S. peer educators from Columbia County. He expressed his admiration and support for their work and agreed to visit their Teen Clinic later this year.

UNITY IN THE COMMUNITY: AGAINST HATE

In early February, word spread quickly that an extremist hate group from Kansas was scheduled to protest in Albany on March 6, 2009. UHPP staff participated as key organizers and supporters of the March 6 Coalition, organizing community events in response to the announced visit by the Rev. Fred Phelps and members of his Westboro Church. At the "Unity in Community" vigil outside Albany City Hall on March 5, more than 350 peo-

ple, including our Albany S.T.A.R.S. peer educators, sang and spoke out against hate and prejudice. March 6 events included a counter protest at Albany High School, a rally at the SUNY Administrative Building and a UNITY Brunch at the uptown University campus. This was a wonderful coming together of young and old, gay and straight, black and white, and people of many faiths.

Always full of energy and ideas, the UHPP S.T.A.R.S. (Seriously Talking About Responsible Sex) peer educators of Albany and Columbia Counties continue to make an impression. Each year, these high school students from Albany, Chatham, Hudson and Tacnonic Hills High Schools are trained to present programs on sexual health and responsibility in classrooms and at after-school programs and to serve as approachable sources of factual information in or out of the classroom.

But why stop at these traditional school-based activities? Our S.T.A.R.S. peer educators are constantly on the lookout for ways to make their messages heard, and to reach other teens with information. For example, in March of this year, the Albany S.T.A.R.S. peer educators joined a "Unity in Community Vigil" at Albany's City Hall, organized to counter the presence of a hate group at their high school. Their presence and proud banner demonstrated the links between the struggle for reproductive choice and the struggle for a society free from racism, homophobia and heterosexism. Albany peer educators also presented a workshop at the Nation-Wide Youth Symposium at Trinity Institute and tabled at the First Annual Latino Youth Summit held at Siena College.

According to Albany's CBAPP/S.T.A.R.S. Program Facilitator, Maureen Murphy,"we are very fortunate that the teens in our program are committed to so many different education and outreach activities. In fact, our biggest challenge is helping them be selective and realistic in what they commit to, because they want to be everywhere!"

One way that the Columbia County S.T.A.R.S. peer educators have tackled the desire "to be everywhere" is to be virtually everywhere using the web and social networking sites. In a re-

cent study, the American Psychological Society found that between 75% and 90% of US teens use the Internet to email, instant message (IM), visit chat rooms and explore other sites. The study showed that more than 70% of 15 to 17-year-olds have sought health information online and 40% of these searches have been related to a sexual topic.

In 2008, our Columbia County S.T.A.R.S. launched their own creative YouTube video entitled, "Condom Myth Busters." To date, that video has received over 8,000 hits, visits and viewings. This year, they followed up their success with the production of a sequel, "Myth Busters 2." Now, they are ready to launch their own MySpace and Facebook pages which will contain sexual health information, links to related websites, information about UHPP services for teens, upcoming S.T.A.R.S. events and opportunities to ask questions.

"If we really want to be effective in reaching the teens in our area and overcome the barriers of transportation and distance, we have to literally meet the teens where they are," explained UHPP Youth Program Facilitator Nicole Dallas. "Based on what our expert peer educators have told us, the Internet is the key."
